

Message from Mayor Cyril Kleem


During this unprecedented national emergency, I want to assure you that the City is doing whatever it can to keep you safe while maintaining basic services.

The circumstances change daily and often hourly and we are following Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Ohio Department of Health guidelines.

Measures we have taken include closing the Berea Recreation Center and the Active Senior Network indefinitely. City Hall is open and is cleaned daily. After the commercial cleaning crew leaves, the Berea Service Department sanitizes the building further. The Jitney is cleaned after rides. Smith School is cleaned daily and sanitizer is used on surfaces.

Additional safeguards and closings may happen as the situation develops.

We are our brother's and sister's keepers. Those of us who are least vulnerable to COVID-19 or better able to fight it and survive it have a duty to protect the most vulnerable among us. For example, if you go to work, work out, socialize with friends, you may have had contact with someone who is a carrier or someone who has just started to have symptoms. You use precautions, wash your hands, but some of the virus may have lingered on your clothing. Then you visit grandma and grandpa – the most vulnerable among us. You may be OK. They are not.

I have often said that Berea is a community and the most important part of that word community is unity. We are in this together. Residents are donating non-perishable food items for students who rely on the school breakfast and lunch programs. We are stocking the Little Food Pantries. We take care of our neighbors.

Government can only do so much. But the community – the churches, civic organizations and our friends and neighbors working together with the City – can do a lot to make this very trying time bearable.

As we enter this holy season of Easter and Passover, please know that my family and I are praying for all of us.

Dave Pusti named Grindstone Award recipient

Dave Pusti moved to Berea in 1978, following his new bride who got a job teaching art in the Strongsville Schools.

"We wanted a small town with a good school system," he said. "I met a lot of people through the Jaycees," he added, "and that drew me into volunteering."

Four decades later, Pusti has accumulated a laundry list of volunteer stints from coaching youth soccer to serving on the Berea Board of Education.

Those accomplishments have garnered him the Berea Chamber of Commerce's Grindstone Award as an outstanding citizen.

Pusti grew up in the W. 123rd and Harvard Avenue neighborhood of Cleveland, graduating from Cleveland Central Catholic High School in 1970. He went on to graduate from Kent State University in 1975 with a degree in architecture. He now is president and managing partner of Makovich & Pusti Architects Inc., which was founded in 1986. The firm moved from Park Street to its current location at 111 Front St. in 2000. The firm bought the vintage 1897 building and extensively renovated it, keeping the historic feel as much as possible.

His work has been mainly local, designing renovations for Baldwin Wallace University's student union, working on Guidestone's Reinberger Chapel, for example, as well as projects for local hospitals, including the VA's Louis Stokes Medical Center, Marymount Hospital, South Pointe Hospital, UH St. John Medical Center, UH Cleveland Medical Center and St. Vincent Charity Hospital.

In between all this, Pusti coached soccer and Little League Baseball, supported Berea Arts Fest, served on Berea Planning Commission, served on the Little Red School House Foundation board, member of Kiwanis, President of the Berea Chamber of Commerce, active in PTA, treasurer for the Education Foundation for five years and member of the Board for 10, member of the Berea Board of Education for 13 years, member of the Polaris Career Center Board of Education and lector at St. Mary's Church for 25 years, just to name a few.

He and wife Joanna raised three children amid the busy schedule and now have six grandchildren. "I did my best to make the time" for all these activities, Pusti said. Joanna passed away in 2012. He has established an enrichment grant through the Education Foundation in her memory. Pusti remarried three years ago to wife Mary.

Pusti said he is very proud of all of his affiliations but counts his time on the Board of Education and the Education Foundation as especially meaningful to him. "The school board was a major commitment," he said, "the time involved and the finances."



Now it's time to step back a bit. He plans to retire from Makovich & Pusti in December and "continue part time for a while."

"I've been doing this for 34 years. It's time for someone else to take over."

His commitment to Berea remains strong. "I am a product of the community," he said. "This has been a nice family place to be a member of."

The Berea Chamber of Commerce's Grindstone Award Dinner will be in late September at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Middleburg Heights. Details will be announced later.

The Ohio Attorney General's office has launched a new consumer protection campaign **#JUSTDONTANSWER** in response to the enormous volume of robocalls that Ohio citizens receive every day, month and year.

Robocalls are auto-dialed calls that deliver a prerecorded message. While some are legal, such as calls from your child's school or your doctor's office, others are illegal because you have not consented to them and they generally try to get you to pay for something or provide personal information.

The recommendation from the Attorney General's office is to just not answer the call. Let the call go to voicemail and then either choose to listen to it or not and do research, if necessary, to determine if it is a legitimate call. Do not press any numbers if you do pick up.

You can report illegal robocalls by texting the word "ROBO" to 888111, or by visiting the Ohio Protects portion of the OAG's web site at <https://www.ohioprotects.org/>. At this link, you also can watch videos about robocalls, read about robocall basics and review the robocall do's and don'ts.

Berea named one of Safest Cities

Berea has been named one of Ohio's Top Ten safest cities by the National Council for Home Safety and Security. Berea ranked No. 9 out of more than 2,000 Ohio cities. No. 1 was Olmsted Township. Telephone scams target seniors

The Ohio Department of Insurance is warning seniors about two new telephone scams. One scam seeks Social Security Number information and the other asks for personal information to set up a pre-paid funeral.

Medicare beneficiaries are receiving recorded calls that appear on Caller ID as coming from the Social Security Administration. The message says that the Social Security account has been suspended and to press 1 for more information. Pressing 1 gets you to a scammer who asks for personal information. The SSA will not call unless the beneficiary requests it.

In the second scam, Ohio Public Employee Retirement System members are receiving calls from a scammer claiming to be from VIA Benefits. The caller asks for personal information to set up a pre-paid funeral account. The real VIA is not making such calls.

Call the Ohio Department of Insurance fraud hotline at (800) 686-1527 to report suspicious calls. Seniors also can contact the non-profit Pro Seniors and its Ohio Senior Medicare Patrol at (800) 488-6070.

Stroke is preventable & beatable

(Information supplied by the Berea Fire Department)

A stroke is a sudden interruption in the blood supply of the brain. Most strokes are caused by an abrupt blockage of arteries leading to the brain (ischemic stroke). Other strokes are caused by bleeding into brain tissue when a blood vessel bursts (hemorrhagic stroke).

Stroke is preventable, treatable and beatable. Up to 80 percent of strokes can be prevented by not smoking, making healthy food choices, getting enough physical activity, maintaining a healthy weight and treating conditions such as high blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar.

To help spot stroke signs in someone, use the letters "F.A.S.T" and know when to call 9-1-1.

F=Face droop on one side or numb. Ask person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven?

A=Arm weakness or numbness. Ask person to hold both arms straight out (palms up) and close eyes. Does one arm drift?

S=Speech is slurred when talking. Is the person hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence.

T=Time to call 9-1-1. If person shows any of these symptoms, call 9-1-1 immediately!

Optometrist opens new office

Caitlin Filips, O.D., dreamed of being an optometrist since the age of 4. Once she had her degree in hand, her goal was to operate her own free-standing business. Mission accomplished.

Filips opened her practice in her newly constructed building on Bagley Road last year. She and her staff have settled in and are looking forward to expanding the client list.

After eight years at the Helwig Whistlestop, Filips said it was time to branch out on her own. "I've always wanted to be my own landlord," she said. The late Ted Macosko, a local architect, designed her building at the corner of Bagley and Lindberg Boulevard. Filips said the 2,683-square-foot business is about the same size as her previous Whistlestop office but the new digs come with a storage shed and room to expand if that becomes necessary. The $\frac{1}{2}$ -acre lot was rezoned from residential single family to commercial center district in 2017.

The City worked with Filips to help the new building become a reality. Berea awarded Filips a Sign Rebate Grant and the Building Improvement Grant.

Filips, who graduated from The Ohio State University College of Optometry in 2008, said she wanted to follow in her uncle's footsteps. As a young girl, her parents took her to Columbus for Uncle Jim Tomko's graduation from OSU's optometry school. He's still in practice in Aurora. She was duly impressed. While other kids waffled between wanting to be teachers or astronauts, Filips set her sights early on to becoming an "eye doctor."

The journey began at Miami University (Ohio) where she earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry. Then on to OSU. In 2009, she purchased

Procare Vision Center from optician Jim Rump, who was retiring, and Rump's daughter, Sue Church. Church is now the optician with Filips' office. In 2011, Filips moved the practice to Helwig Whistlestop.

Filips and husband, Randy Rees, live in Olmsted Falls with their tabby cat Iris, but they remain active in Berea. She is a long-time sponsor of the Berea Recreation Center and City events, such as the festivals and movie nights. Safety News You Can Use

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Distracted driving is anything that diverts your attention from driving, including texting or talking on your phone, talking to people in your vehicle, changing the music on your radio, inputting addresses into your navigation system, or anything else that takes your attention away from the roadway.

According to the National Safety Council, using a cell phone while driving results in 1.6 million crashes per year. One out of every four car accidents in the U.S. is caused by texting while driving, an activity that is six times more likely to cause an accident than drunken driving.

Although teens are the focus in many distracted driving campaigns, just like so many other things, parents need to set the example and be responsible while driving with their children. Parents also need to have conversations with their teens about the dangers of distracted driv-

ing. That conversation and reinforcement at home can include, prior to your teen getting his or her license, having your teen sign a driving contract that prohibits distracted driving.

Distracted driving is not only dangerous, it is against the law. Currently, 48 states have texting while driving bans, and 38 states ban all cell phone use by teen drivers. Berea Codified Ordinance 731.44 prohibits the use of cell phones to text while driving in Berea. A conviction for texting while driving will cost you up to a \$150 fine for your first offense, up to a \$250 fine for your second offense, and up to a \$500 fine for each subsequent offense. If you are found to be distracted in other ways, you also run the risk of a citation for Full Time and Attention, Berea Codified Ordinance 731.34(c).

Distracted driving is preventable, and when people choose to make smart choices in their vehicles the roadway is a much safer place. Make today the first day you stop using your cell phone in your vehicle while driving!

Be careful in school zones

Drivers are asked to observe the 20 mph speed limit in school zones. Flashing lights on Race Street indicate when students and buses are arriving and departing from Grindstone Elementary School. Crossing guards are stationed at the corner of Race and West streets and at the bus entrance to Grindstone. They often must stand in the street to allow children to use the pedestrian crosswalks and to allow buses to safely enter and exit the parking lot. Drivers should use caution when approaching crossing guards, who are members of Berea's Veterans Security Team, as they aid children on their way to and from school.

Also, remember that Race Street is one-way from 8:30-9:30 a.m. and from 3:30-4:30 p.m. while students are arriving and departing the school.

HEALTHY HOUSING TIPS

Spring is clean up time

You work hard to keep yourself and your family healthy. Spring is a good time to make sure your house is healthy too.

Berea's Exterior Maintenance Office recommends homeowners walk the property and take a survey of what damage winter and cold temperatures might have done to the yard and the outside of the house. There are six areas homeowners can take a close look at as the weather starts to warm.

- Yards:** Missing ground cover or bare spots; debris from stumps, trees or trash; animal waste.
- Foundations:** shifted or cracked blocks or bricks; loose or missing mortar.
- Porches, patios & decks:** broken or deteriorated floor boards, posts or railings; broken concrete or bricks; flaking paint.
- Roofs:** broken or missing shingles; moss or mildew; damaged awnings or canopies.
- Exterior walls:** broken or deteriorating siding or brick; fading or peeling paint; rusted metal.
- Gutters & downspouts:** loose connections; rust; missing or broken sections.

A complete list of suggestions is available from the Exterior Maintenance Office at Smith School, 535 Wyleswood Drive.

Yard waste pickup by Republic Services begins on Friday, April 17. The City of Berea also offers free brush pickup. Call the Berea Service Department at (440) 826-5816 to arrange for pickup. You also can schedule pickup at the City's web site, www.cityofberea.org.

A crew of inspectors from the Code Enforcement Division makes regular rounds of residential neighborhoods. If they notice an issue or a violation of the Exterior Maintenance Code, they will leave an inspection report that explains the violations as well as the corrections to be made. Homeowners are urged to contact inspectors for further information and assistance. The goal of the Exterior Maintenance Office is not punitive but to help homeowners keep their properties healthy and their neighborhoods attractive.

City honors Model UN students

Taking part in Model United Nations "really grew my public speaking skills," said Berea-Midpark Middle School student Ellie Connor. "I had to think on my feet."

Connor and 10 of her classmates were recognized by Berea City Council for winning top honors at the Junior Model UN conference at John Carroll University. The conference is sponsored by the Cleveland Council on World Affairs.

Faculty adviser Stacey Jennings, who began the program seven years ago, said students were assigned to represent various countries on committees. They debated real world issues such as human trafficking and the use of children as soldiers.

Connor and her partner Emma Escalier represented North Korea, a daunting challenge, Jennings said. Connor won the Gavel Award, the highest honor Model UN can present. It meant she had to "know the country's policies, understand parliamentary procedures and exhibit confidence in public speaking," Jennings said.

Connor said it was "a bit stressful representing a country that is not popular" but she was grateful for the experience. She credited Escalier "for the team effort." The two said they had but one ally – Russia.

Berea to hire new trash hauler

Kimble Recycling and Disposal Inc. is the City's new trash hauler.

Kimble was the low bidder of three companies that submitted bids, which were opened on March 3. Service Department Director Paul Anzalone said the firms were given 16 options. Anzalone said he studied all of the bids on those options and said Kimble's was the lowest, most responsible and most responsive.

Other bidders were Republic Services, the City's current trash hauler, and Rumpke.

Kimble's bid for the first year of the contract is \$1,275,300. It includes five-day automated trash and recycling collection with weekly bulk pickup. Yard waste will be picked up weekly all year long but will not be recycled. Anzalone said including yard waste in the recycling would have added another \$156,000 to the contract. Yard waste will be included in bulk pickup.

Kimble will receive a five-year contract with options for three additional years. The rate increases each year with the cost going to \$1,449,240 in Year 5.

Paul Chontos, Rich Lasecki and Dave Ulman usually spend their work days at the Berea Service Garage, driving snow plows, fixing water main breaks and filling potholes.

But they took some time off on Feb. 28 to visit the Berea Branch Library and about 13 children plus parents and grandparents. First, the men read to the children. The books were related to their jobs.

Chontos, the supervisor at the Service Department garage, read "Super Truck," being careful to show the boys and girls the pictures. Ulman followed up with "Ride the Big Machine."

Then it was off to the parking lot where the children clambered over a real snow plow and a front-end loader. When asked which truck he liked the best. Ben, 4 1/2, said "both." "He enjoys anything with trucks," explained grandmother Susan Madden.

The quarterly program "People in Your Neighborhood" is meant to introduce youngsters to a variety of workers in the community. The first program in the fall featured the Berea Police Department.

Time for the US Census

Residents should have received in the mail a notice from the U.S. Census 2020 asking them to fill out the official Census form.

The notice includes a Census ID number, which people can use to fill out the questionnaire online at my2020census.gov. by April 1. For those who may prefer a paper version, the Census Bureau will send a paper questionnaire in a few weeks when residents do not complete the online form. It is possible that door-to-door interviewers will also canvass neighborhoods.

If you need help filling out the form, you can call toll free, (844) 330-2020.

The Census is conducted by the U.S. Department of Commerce every 10 years. It is used to count every person living in your household. The results are used to allocate federal funds to states and communities

and to determine the number of representatives state voters may elect to Congress. When populations decline, states lose representatives. When populations increase, the states gain representatives.

The questionnaire takes on average about 10 minutes to complete. It is available in 13 different languages. The information you provide is protected by law. The Census Bureau is not permitted to release your responses or identify you. The data collected determines population in your location, income levels and other statistics.

You are required by law to complete the Census form. The Census is conducted every 10 years as required by the U.S. Constitution.
